

MESSAGE FROM THE INTERIM DIRECTOR



Welcome to Fall 2022 semester! I am excited to introduce myself- and reintroduce myself to those I have worked with in the program. My name is Caroline Muglia (she/her) and I am the Interim Director of the MMLIS program where I have taught as a faculty member since 2016. In this role, I will focus on student and faculty success through our committee and advisory board work, strategic planning efforts, and professional development opportunities including Conversations with Leaders (CWL) and alumni panels. I will also focus on preparing this position for a permanent Director, a role we will begin envisioning soon.

I teach two classes in the program: LIM 502, Collection Development and Management; and LIM 503, Information Description, Organization and Retrieval. Typically, students enroll in these classes in their second and third semesters of the program. If I haven't met you in class, I look forward to it! My

teaching philosophy is rooted in inclusive pedagogy and practices. In my courses, this means that I focus course assignments and my syllabus towards meaningful, relevant, and accessible learning.

In my day job, I am the Associate Dean of Specialized Collections at USC Libraries where I have worked, in different roles, since 2015. As the Associate Dean, I focus on five branch libraries that have a common function of acquiring and stewarding special collections and rare materials. I have a range of experiences in different library environments including academic, government, and private libraries. Prior to librarianship, I was a political organizer and fundraiser. For all of you second (or third) career librarians, I see you!

I grew up in New Jersey and have lived throughout the country. These days, I live in New England with my spouse, adopted 4-year-old (I am a proud foster and adoptive parent), and 2 aging (and generally suspicious) cats that have not mastered Zoom etiquette. Before you ask, yes there are more cows than people in the state. And yes, the seasons are glorious and- on occasion- rugged.

I am thrilled to take on this leadership role in the MMLIS Program. My leadership style is participative leadership, which encourages listening to and engaging stakeholders in the decision-making process. This means I communicate with my fellow teaching faculty about ways to strengthen their contribution to the Program. It also means that I will be engaging with you, the students- current and alumni- about your insight into ways to critically examine what can be improved and enhance what's working well.

organized by the Information Schools and Colleagues Collaborative Network, a consortium of ischools and LIS programs across the nation.



ILS Director **Win Shih** and Hayward librarian **Lori Patel**, MMLIS 2021, moderated a panel discussion at the 2022 ALA Annual Conference on leadership lessons from librarians managing indigenous collections at four academic libraries in Canada,

In October, they will present at the 2022 PRRLA (Pacific Rim Research Libraries Alliance) virtual meeting on decolonization practices within five indigenous collections. collaborates with a faculty member on a technology project.

DEIA+AR COMMITTEE UPDATE

During the Summer of 2022 the DEIA+AR committee continued our work and made several significant advancements. As our new chair I am happy to provide updates on our activities and welcome anyone who would like to reach out to discuss our work or collaborate with us. Our Commitment

Statement (voted in by faculty in 2021) now appears prominently on our website and promotional materials. The DEIA+AR Recommendations for pedagogical, curricular, and programmatic actions was voted in unanimously by faculty (2022) and shared with faculty and administration so that everyone can begin to incorporate DEIA+AR in their work as appropriate.

The committee successfully applied for and received two grants. We received the Zumberge Grant to perform a systematic review on DEIA+AR Library and Information Science pedagogical interventions. This grant funds our resource employee (MMLIS alumni) Jane Kim and our student research assistant Robert Rosas to aid the systematic review research project. Additionally, it funded technology and software needed for the systematic review methodology.

We also received the USC Libraries Research Grant which is funding our research assistant Kalyani Jog, who is assisting with the development of assessment strategies for, and examples of, how to incorporate the recommendations. Specifically, the assessment strategies will ensure our work is regularly evaluated and revised as needed. We have developed a rough draft "expanded diversity calendar" to augment our program's academic calendar to be more inclusive of holidays and important dates to assist our faculty in engaging students beyond the traditionally recognized

holiday calendar. While we hope that our faculty begin to incorporate applicable recommendations for their courses now, we will develop examples and assessment strategies that will assist faculty if needed. Also, so that we remain cognizant of the impact of our efforts and are able to adapt the recommendations as needed.

These will be presented at a future faculty meeting upon completion. Please remember, no one is expected to incorporate all the recommendations, we hope that faculty can just start with one or two that are relevant to their course and begin to move the needle so that we are a role model for other programs.

Abigail Robinson, MMLIS'22



Abigail is a recent summer 2022 MMLIS graduate. During her time in the online Master of Management in Library and Information Science program, she held an internship at NBC Peacock which has transitioned into a

full-time job upon graduation. Abigail's aspirations of working as a teen librarian changed during her time as a student. As she built her network as a student and studied different aspects of librarianship, she realized that she was interested in metadata and its use in the entertainment industry. What was your career path before and after completing the MMLIS program?

Before completing the MMLIS program, I aspired to become a teen librarian. I worked in the public library space for years and always enjoyed helping patrons discover a new book series or tv show and making information accessible. After learning about metadata during Caroline Muglia's Collection Development course, I began learning more about metadata and its use in the entertainment industry. Since completing the MMLIS program, my career path has transitioned from public librarianship to special libraries by working for the entertainment industry as a metadata specialist.

How has your work been influenced by the skills you learned in the program?

Because of the MMLIS program, I am a more assertive communicator. Working with cohorts in different time zones taught me the importance of frequent communication. I want my coworkers to be abreast of projects in progress, but I am aware that not receiving a response ASAP is not the end of the world. I have used leadership and organizational skills to create new workflows and organize content in a digital setting.

What can you tell us about the work being done in your area of librarianship today and in the coming years?

I'll work with metadata and content management for NBC Peacock in my new position. My job duties will include creating and editing episode descriptions, managing tag schemas, and mining and tagging Peacock's content for diversity. In the coming years, I hope to share my knowledge about librarianship in the entertainment industry with future MLIS graduates.

What advice would you like to give our current students?

My advice to current students is to start building their network now. If your career interest doesn't align with traditional librarianship (i.e., public or academic libraries), find a mentor that can help you learn more about the industry. Do not hesitate to reach out to people on LinkedIn or USC's alumni network. The faculty and staff of the MMLIS program are more than willing to help you form connections; they are your best resource. Lastly, know that the skills you will learn in the MMLIS program are highly marketable and versatile.
